PASTOR'S COLUMN

"Come Home for Christmas"

As we begin the season of Advent, we look forward to celebrating the birth of the Christ Child. We long for God to come in new ways. Our sense of hope has been challenged by recent events.

On Sunday, November 21st, an SUV plowed into a crowd of people attending the Waukesha Christmas Parade. At least five were killed, forty others injured and an extended community in shock. If attending a Christmas Parade is not safe, what is?

Almost every day, we learn of other acts of violence and shootings that demonstrate a total disregard for human life.

Despite our excellent vaccines and many safety precautions, the pandemic continues, hospitalizations increase and more people die.

Our world is a mess. We need God's hope.

During Advent we do not simply celebrate something that happened a long time ago. We long for God to come and work in new ways in our midst. We wait patiently—and sometimes impatiently—for God's Spirit. Like the biblical prophets and all the characters of the Christmas story, we desperately need hope, now more than ever.

Whether we worship in-person or online, I invite us to Come Home for Christmas where we live with the hope that God will surprise us.

AFGHAN RESETTLEMENT: CALL FOR HOUSING LEADS

Currently, Jewish Social Services has 36 clients who have recently fled Afghanistan. The Resettlement Team has been working hard to ensure that they have access to independent, stable, and comfortable housing in Dane County.

Just this past week, the Team was able to secure permanent housing for a family of 7 and a family of 3. We are still in search of permanent housing for 2 individuals, each seeking efficiency units. In addition, we expect to welcome at least 7 more families to the Dane County Area in the coming weeks. This is all taking place while the Resettlement Team continues to serve populations who come from countries other than Afghanistan.

Over the past 23 years, CONACADO has grown from 700 members organized in 3 locations, to over 9,500 members organized in 9 locations with 142 local community associations throughout the Dominican Republic.

Each of the 9 groups or “bloques” has a similar organizational structure: an Assembly of Delegates, with two delegates per association, that meets once a month to report on work plan progress at the community level; a Governing Board that meets once a month to execute the work plan; and an Administrative Committee that meets once a week to follow up on the work plan to make sure it is going as it should.

A General Assembly meets once a year to approve work plans and decide how FAIR TRADE premiums will be used. The co-operative’s success in quality improvement and marketing means that 70% of their cacao is sold as high quality fermented beans, primarily to European niche markets: Organic, Biodynamic, and FAIR TRADE.

Today, CONACADO members produce approximately 25% of the cacao exported from the Dominican Republic and the organization has become a powerful alternative for small-scale producers.

FOR THE LOVE OF GOD'S CREATION

...think about this...

“Nearly 200 countries signed off on a **new climate agreement at the COP26 summit** in Glasgow a few weeks ago. [According to PBS Newshour, here are the big takeaways]:

1. **Participants of the summit all “agreed to ‘phase down’ the use of coal**, an initial step toward phasing out the use of coal completely. Twenty-three countries specifically, pledged to stop constructing or allowing new coal power plants. More than 40 countries said they would phase out coal power entirely. **They also agreed to ‘phase out’ subsidies for fossil fuels.**
2. To limit warming to 1.5 degrees Celsius, ‘deep reductions’ in greenhouse emissions are necessary. **New targets include:**
 - **Reducing CO2 emissions by 45% by 2030 compared to 2010 levels**
 - **Reaching net-zero emissions by 2050** (or so)
3. A key agreement on methane emissions – the second-largest contributor to climate change – was also made. **More than 100 countries pledged to cut methane emissions by 30%**, compared to 2020 levels, by 2030
4. **Wealthy, developed countries were ‘urged’ to:**
 - **...deliver a long-promised \$100 billion per year in aid to developing nations** hit hardest by climate change
 - **...greatly increase those donations** – compared to amounts given in 2019 – by 2025
5. **More than 140 countries promised to end deforestation by 2030.** Deforestation is a significant contributor of greenhouse gas emissions; when forests are knocked down, the carbon stored by the trees is released into the atmosphere. It also threatens human livelihoods and animal habitats.”

[Unfortunately], “There’s **no enforcement mechanism** for any of the goals agreed to at COP26 – meaning that countries can’t be held accountable for their promises. Many activists and experts doubt that these goals will be enough to limit catastrophic warming, though some acknowledge that the agreement is a step in the right direction. ... **But** a signal has been sent that **the era of coal is ending**. And, that matters!”

In summary, said Antonio Guterres, United Nations Secretary-General, “**Our fragile planet is hanging by a thread. We are still knocking on the door of climate catastrophe. It is time to go into emergency mode – or our chance of reaching net-zero will itself be zero.**”

We are facing a sobering reality. **We, the stewards of the earth, are called to help in whatever ways we see possible to prevent a climate catastrophe.** (Watch for specific ideas coming in Hilltop Herald in January). **During this Christmas season, ponder this: WE ARE HOLDING THE LIVES OF OUR YOUNG PEOPLE IN OUR HANDS!**

SCARCITY OR ABUNDANCE - WHAT ARE YOU LOOKING FOR?

“Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you.” ~ Matthew 7:7

Pastor John Pavlovitz tells a story about a time when he was a young youth leader and he found himself overly worried about the future. He was sharing his concerns with his pastor, who replied, “John, do you know why a bluebird finds worms? Because that’s what it looks for.”

John remembers his pastor continuing to tell him that much of what we discover in this life is about the questions we ask, the things we give attention to, and the way we invest our time. The more John was aware of the orientation of his life at any given moment, and the more intentional he was along the way, his pastor counseled, the more John could rest in knowing that he’d eventually end up where he needed to be.

What are you aware of during this Advent and Christmas season? What are you looking for? With global supply chain issues along with the commercialized nature of the holidays, it is easy to fall into a scarcity mindset. However, if we choose to focus on the blessings we have and look to see where God is at work in our lives, in our churches, and communities – we are more likely to experience the joy and peace, not only of the season but that Christ offers all – no matter what time of year.
