Hearing God: Developing a Conversational Relationship with God by Dallas Willard

We will begin our new book study on **Sunday January 9**. Our plans are to meet as usual at 11:30am after the service. Whether that means in person in the library or by Zoom depends upon the Covid situation. You should purchase your own book.

"God spoke to me." "The Spirit spoke to my heart." "God revealed the idea to me." Being close to God means communicating with him-telling him what is on our hearts in prayer and hearing and understanding what he is saying to us. It is this second half of our conversation with God that is so important but that can also be so difficult. How do we hear his voice? How can we be sure that what we think we hear is not our own subconscious? What role does the Bible play? What if what God says to us is not clear? The key, says best-selling author Dallas Willard, is to focus not so much on individual actions and decisions as on building our personal relationship with our Creator. In this updated and expanded edition of Willard's beloved book, originally published as In Search of Guidance, you'll gain rich spiritual insight into how we can hear God's voice clearly and develop an intimate partnership with him in the work of his kingdom. Including new material from Dallas Willard's teaching at the Renovaré Institute and reformatted to be even easier to read, this classic continues to endure as one of today's best resources for learning to listen closely to God.

## MISSION OF THE MONTH UMCOR-US DISASTER RELIEF

On Friday, December 10 a massive storm swept across Arkansas, Illinois, Kentucky, Missouri, Mississippi and Tennessee. There were sixty confirmed tornadoes and a path of destruction longer than two hundred miles.

Homes and small businesses were ripped off their foundations. An Amazon Warehouse, in southern, Illinois, collapsed. Even churches came tumbling down. Ironically during the Advent Season—a season of candles— the Mayfield, Kentucky Candle factory was reduced to rubble and with much of their community demolished.

This devastation was so catastrophic that it will take weeks, if not months or longer, to fully grasp how bad. The confirmed death toll rises each day.

In times like this, we can be proud that our United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) is already on the ground caring for victims and communities in the aftermath of this tragedy. Every dollar we give to UMCOR—down to the last cent—supports those in need. None of this giving is used for administrative, promotion or publicity costs.

## FOR THE LOVE OF GOD'S CREATION REMEMBER

#### ...WE ARE HOLDING THE LIVES OF OUR YOUNG PEOPLE IN OUR HANDS...

After the COP 26, the huge climate conference in Glascow this fall, we were reminded that we, the stewards of the earth, are called, now more than ever before, to help in whatever ways we see possible to prevent a climate catastrophe.

You may already have made some changes to reduce your carbon foot print. The following might give you ideas about what else you could do:

#### 1. Reduce your energy use and switch to renewable energy

- "As energy is primarily generated by the burning of fossil fuels, one of the most important things to do is to reduce energy consumption and to switch to renewable energy sources.
- ...switch, [if you can] your home energy supply to a green energy plan or change to a 100% renewable energy provider... or reduce your dependence on fossil fuels by installing solar panels at your home, buying a solar water heater or using solar powered tech wherever you can (outdoor or portable lighting, mobile phone power banks, etc).
- Reduce energy consumption by installing only LED lights in your house and choosing energyefficient appliances and heating and cooling solutions.
- Reduce energy consumption by properly insulating your home with appropriate heat trapping or cooling materials that will reduce the amount of energy needed to warm or cool your home."

#### 2. Change the way you travel

- "Cycle or walk whenever possible, or use an electric bike or scooter.
- Use public transport (bus, tram, train) instead of a private car.
- If you have no choice but to use a car, think about ride-sharing instead of travelling individually.
- If you're buying a new or second-hand car, opt for more environmentally friendly electric vehicles if you can.
- Restrict your flights substantially and opt for direct flights whenever possible."

#### 3. Change what you eat

- "One of the best things you can do for our planet is to substantially increase the number of fruits and vegetables you eat.
- Eating a healthy and balanced diet with a larger proportion and a wide variety of plant-based foods, only buying meat and fish from sustainable sources, and not wasting food, all help to protect our planet. Check out our **Planet-friendly diet guide** (https://planetbaseddiets.panda.org/) for more information!"

#### 4. Change how much you buy and who you buy from

- "Reduce your consumption overall.
- Choose recycled products and remember to recycle things you no longer need.
- Support companies who have strong sustainable values and practices.
- Lobby your pension fund and your bank to 'go green' and not support any fossil fuel investments
  and to increase their sustainable values and practices or move your savings into 'green' funds."

#### 5. Campaign and vote!

- "Become a climate warrior and join local climate marches and support petitions that call for more sustainable practices.
- Ask your company, landlord, school, university and/or city to make the change to renewable energy, support energy-saving campaigns, and make it easier to walk, bike, and use public transportation.
- Vote for public officials who support ambitious climate change action and increasing sustainability, like increasing nature-based solutions, protecting nature and scaling up renewable energy."

#### SCARCITY OR ABUNDANCE - WHAT ARE YOU LOOKING FOR?

A few years ago, I read a fun book by A.J. Jacobs called *The Year of Living Biblically: One Man's Quest to Follow the Bible as Literally as Possible*. It's important to note that Jacobs, a journalist and author, is Jewish and agnostic. For one year, he tried to follow every biblical "rule" as literally as possible. This includes well-known rules like "Love your neighbor" and the Ten Commandments, as well as lesser-known commands to stone adulterers (which he does by throwing little pebbles at a rather cranky man he meets in a park who brags to Jacobs about an affair he is involved in). Jacobs also decided to follow the biblical instruction to tithe, deciding to give away 10 percent of his income.

After convincing his wife to join him, Jacobs gave the donations away to several charities electronically. He describes his experience this way, "The giving was painful. I mean, 10 percent? That would have an impact on our lives. Vacations would need to be scaled back; new furniture would have to wait. It was huge. When I pressed 'send' on the donations, my palms got wet, my heart rate spiked."

In giving, Jacobs felt the fear that is common to all of us. The fear of not having enough. However, that wasn't all he experienced. He continues:

"It was a pain mixed with pleasure. When the confirmation email pinged in, I felt good. There's a haunting line from the movie Chariots of Fire. It's spoken by Ian Charleson, who plays a deeply religious sprinter in the 1924 Olympics. He says: 'When I run, I feel his pleasure.' And as I gave away money, I think I might have felt God's pleasure. Which is odd. Because I'm agnostic. I don't know if there's a God or not, but still I've felt some high sense of purpose. It was like a cozy ember that started at the back of my neck and slowly spread its warmth through my skull. I felt like I was doing something I should have done all my life."

Ultimately, Jacobs' generosity changed him. I wonder, how our relationship with God and our lives might be vivified because of our giving?
