PASTOR'S COLUMN

An unwelcome guest arrived. I didn't invite it, but it came anyway. I told it to leave, but it wouldn't go away easily. A stubborn intruder—burnout. For nearly two months, I have lived with this uninvited guest. I found myself unable to do anything and, worse, unwilling to do anything. I thought it would pass quickly, but it stayed longer than expected and weighed me down more than I imagined.

The transition from Alabama to Wisconsin was far more challenging than I had anticipated. I assumed I would naturally adapt over time, but this time, it wasn't so easy. I kept pushing myself, believing that if I endured long enough, I would eventually feel at home. I kept running, pushing forward, proving myself over and over again. But after completing the Visioning Workshop at the end of January, I hit a wall. Frustration and exhaustion overwhelmed me.

To make matters worse, Wisconsin's winter felt long and dull. The cold itself wasn't unbearable, but being indoors for months took a toll on my spirit. Later, I learned that adjusting to a new place requires time—not just weeks or months, but an entire cycle of life's rhythms. The rhythm of a week, a month, and a full year must be experienced before one truly settles in. This winter, I went through that adjustment process head-on. The first step toward healing was honesty. I shared my struggles with the staff, asking for understanding and support. Their encouragement and advice helped immensely. I also opened up in the small group Bible studies that started in February, asking for prayers. When I let go of the expectation that a pastor must always be the one offering help and instead embraced my own weakness, I found people listening, empathizing, and uplifting me in return. Pastors, too, are human. We need spaces to share, be encouraged, and receive

Thankfully, through these small groups, I found comfort and space to breathe. Slowly, from deep within, I began to feel rest and renewal. One of the greatest lessons I've learned is that there are truths in life that can only be seen when we stop moving. In my endless pursuit of accomplishments, I had been blind to what truly matters. But now, I see people more clearly—each person precious, each moment a gift. God's voice, once muffled by my busyness, is becoming clearer.

I have spent more time reflecting, training my heart, body, and soul to find rest in God. I am learning, little by little, what truly matters in life, how to lead Monona UMC in the way God desires, and how to see each soul as God sees them.

Spring is drawing near. And so is the springtime of my soul.

MISSION OF THE MONTH

Monona UMC Community Meal Fund

"If you give some of your own food to those who are hungry and to satisfy [the needs of] those who are humble, then your light will rise in the dark, and your darkness will become as bright as the noonday sun."

Isaiah 58:10

In the post-Covid period during the spring of 2023 Monona UMC recognized that food insecurity was a significant issue facing many Wisconsin residents and the community was also confronted with the serious risk of loneliness and isolation. The church applied for a grant from the Madison Community Foundation to enable us to offer a free community meal, with the hopes of addressing these two issues.

Since Monona United Methodist Church did not have a commercial kitchen some of the meals would have to be catered by a local food provider. The Church also needed a new grill for the summer month cookouts.

Monona United Methodist Church received a \$10,000 grant from the Foundation to serve a free community meal once a month. In the proposal Monona UMC indicated it would contribute another \$10,000 to the project to be carried out over three years.

The first cookout was served on August 31 of 2023. Since beginning the program 50- to 100 meals have been served each month.

Every month volunteers provided setup, serving, bringing desserts and cleaning up after the meal each 4th Thursday of the month. Contributions of time, talent and gifts have made this program successful.

MARCH 2025 ALB MEETING

Accountable Leadership Board Member

Since AJ Feucht has taken a new ministry position away from our church, we are seeking an additional member for the ALB.

Annual Conference: Mark Miller has been asked to attend Annual Conference June 5-8 as our Lay Leader. LeeAnn Sinclair will be on standby to attend if Mark cannot. Annual Conference will be held in the Madison area this year at the Madison Marriott West Convention Center.

AV Installation

We are reviewing two estimates for the purchase and installation of an updated sound and video system for the sanctuary. Both estimates are quite expensive. However, our current 30-year-old sound system does need to be updated/replaced. We will decide how to finance this project with available funds.

Additional Handicapped Parking Spots

The cost to repaint additional spots and install signs to accommodate the parking needs of our members will be at least \$750.

Finance Report/New Insurance for the Church Building

Our financial statement for the month for February was in the black. However, upcoming required expenses for new insurance selected by the conference will be quite high.

Choir Conductor/Staff Singer positions:

Four people have applied for these positions. We will invite them to demonstrate their talents at worship services prior to inviting them to formal interviews. We will finalize the choir conductor position first, then we will figure out whether or not we still need to hire a staff singer.

Worship Items

Our Good Friday Service is scheduled for 7:00 pm April 18th.

Pastor Yohan will incorporate aspects of Maundy Thursday worship into this service.

We need volunteers from the congregation who will be our communion stewards.

Seasonal Banners and Offering Envelopes

Pastor Yohan would like to add seasonal banners to the angled wall in the sanctuary. He will pursue this idea with the Worship Committee to see what we already have.

Carol Jacobson noted that Bashford had special seasonal offering envelopes for those who wanted to give a special offering at Easter, Christmas, etc. and suggested we do the same. Envelopes were placed in the pew racks on holidays. Pastor Yohan will order envelopes for this Easter / Palm Sunday.

Handbells

We currently have two sets of handbells: One set was purchased by MUMC and the other set including chimes came to us from the Bashford church. It may be prudent to sell some of them, but we will wait to consider this when we have a new Choir Director.

Worship Order

Worship begins when Dianne starts playing the Prelude, when it is time to prepare our hearts and minds for worship. However, many people are not seated in the sanctuary. ALB will recommend that the service order may need to be adjusted.

WITH EARTH DAY ON THE HORIZON ... CONSIDER... THE RIGHTS OF NATURE

To most people, Rights of Nature is still a new idea. Our society has environmental laws to protect human health, preserve the environment for present and future generations, and ensure sustainable development. Aren't rights of nature included in these laws?

Environmental laws are to be enforced by government agencies like the EPA to ensure that industries implement strategies that mitigate pollution, reduce waste generation, and conserve resources. But environmental laws can have financial downsides for businesses and workers as well as for consumers. Anti- environmental groups often try to promote a contrary vision that population growth and species extinction are not significant issues, natural resources are plentiful, global warming is not a threat, in trying to render environmental laws unwarranted. Meanwhile, nature suffers.

Unlike current environmental laws, the Rights of Nature Movement does not see nature as human property, a resource for us. Instead, it holds that nature has intrinsic rights to exist, thrive and evolve. It shares a perspective with many Indigenous cultures that all living things are interconnected. The Rights of Nature Movement looks to expand justice until all life on earth is protected by law.

Rights of non-humans is not a new concept. Today, a number of countries including the US have granted corporations many of the same rights as those granted humans. Why should nature not be granted those same rights? With the recognition that natural resources are dwindling, pollution and global warming are destroying many natural habitats leading to rapid extinction of many animal species, rights of nature is becoming more and more important.

RIGHTS OF NATURE WISCONSIN is an organization that has grown from the work of a grassroots group on the Menominee Indian Reservation and Wisdom, a Wisconsin network of mostly progressive faith-based groups working for social justice.
