#### SCHOLARSHIPS AVAILABLE

The Czerepinski Scholarship is awarded to a graduating senior of a local high school who is a member of Monona UMC. The Price scholarship gives preference to graduating seniors and members of Monona UMC, although others continuing their education may be considered. All applicants will be evaluated on the basis of academics (40%), community service (20%), service to the church (20%) and moral character (20%). The awards are to help with tuition, books and supplies.

The Czerepinski fund was established by the estate of Henry Czerepinski, a member of this congregation. The Price endowed scholarship was established by long-time members, Alton and Roma Price.

#### PASTOR'S COLUMN

On January 25, our church held a visioning workshop to explore who we are and what we do as a faith community. Everyone in the church was invited to participate, and 26 people attended. It was a valuable opportunity to listen and learn from one another through group discussions and presentations.

After this process, the strategic team and I gathered to refine and finalize the wording of Monona United Methodist Church's **core values, mission statement**, **and vision statement**. I first shared these with the workshop participants via email, received feedback, and then obtained final approval from the **ALB** (also known as the church council) last week.

Let me begin by explaining the definitions of **core values**, **mission statement**, and **vision statement**, and how they are interconnected:

- MISSION What We Do, Rooted in Our Values
- **VISION** Where We Are Going, Inspired by Our Mission

Now, I present to you the final wording of our **core values, mission statement, and vision statement**. These statements will be displayed throughout the church building, and the vision statement will be proclaimed at the beginning of our Sunday worship service.

This has allowed us and our partners to grow into amazing democratic businesses, influential in local and regional economies. CHOCOLATE-The chocolate industry has a long history of exploitation, child labor, poverty wages and lack of transparency. Conventional chocolate companies are perpetuating these issues on a large scale every day. ## AGRACE GRIEF SUPPORT SPECIALISTS TO HOST SUPPORT GROUPS IN MARCH

Local adults and children living in southern Wisconsin who are grieving can find hope and healing with the help of grief support specialists at Agrace.

This March, grief specialists at the Agrace Grief Support Center, 2906 Marketplace Drive in Fitchburg, will host groups for adults who are grieving the death of a person. Groups provide emotional and peer support in a professionally led group setting and require advance registration.

- Bridges is for adults grieving the death of any loved one. In March, meetings take place Wednesday, March 5 and 19, from 5:30 p.m. to 7 p.m., and March 12, from 9:30 a.m. to 11 a.m. Participants can attend as often as they feel the need for support.
- Young Adult is for anyone aged 18 to 30+ years who is grieving the death of a loved one, parent, child, spouse, sibling or friend. This support group meets once a month, and participants can attend as often as they feel the need for support. In March, the group meets Wednesday, March 12, from 6 p.m. to 7:30 p.m., via Zoom.
- **Mindful Movements** is an event for adults grieving the death of any loved one. This event is intended to relieve stress and tension in the body due to grieving and includes light, gentle movement. In March, the group meets **Wednesday, March 26, from 9:30 a.m.** to 10:45 a.m., at the Agrace Grief Support Center.

There is no fee for Agrace grief support if a participant's family member was served by Agrace Hospice Care in the past 12 months. Modest fees may apply for others, and fees can be lowered or waived, if needed.

One-on-one grief support is also available in-person, by phone or video chat. This support is open to anyone, even if the person who died did not have hospice care.


#### COLD IS CAUSED BY CLIMATE CHANGE TOO ?!? YEP!

You may get someone asking you this week, "Where's your 'global warming' now?? See - it's a figment of your imagination. We've now gotten snow and cold, and our winter is no different than it was decades ago." ... The simple answer [you can say, is that the] Arctic is warming faster than anyplace else.

Why do we care about what's happening at the North Pole (besides worrying about the starving polar bears, and the melting permafrost leaking methane gas, and roads and homes in Alaska collapsing because they're no longer on stable frozen ground)?

Changes in the temperature at the North Pole are making the Polar Vortex (a swirl of cold air around the North Pole) unstable. When the Polar Vortex & Polar Jet Stream get unstable, blobs of very cold air leak down into the southern U.S. Obviously those dips of icy polar air give us some bone-chilling weather. But when it reaches places south in the U.S. that aren't used to cold winters it really wreaks havoc. Citrus crops are very sensitive to



frozenness and so are water pipes. Broken water pipes make a big mess because water spills everywhere. You don't have any water until the pipes get fixed again. Fixing broken pipes and replacing things like walls and carpets that were damaged by the leaking water is expensive.

So, if someone says, "Where's your global warming now?" you can feel confident responding - "It's right here; planetary warming is responsible for this extreme cold snap...

The truth is, on a global scale, this has been the warmest winter on record. Scientists don't just make up those numbers. There are thousands of weather stations all over the world even out on buoys in the middle of the ocean, and up in the Himalayan mountain peaks. And all those daily temperature numbers get compiled by computers and added together and averaged. So, you can have confidence that - no matter how cold one particular day is in the town you live in - on average, temperatures around the globe are continually rising, disrupting weather-related stuff ranging from rainfall to the polar vortex to atmospheric rivers.
