PASTOR'S COLUMN

A Reflection on Spiritual Resilience

Life can often make us feel like jars of clay—easily chipped, cracked, and broken. Sudden illness, the unexpected loss of loved ones, relational wounds, or financial stress expose just how fragile we really are. The apostle Paul never hid that truth. In fact, he declared: "But we have this treasure in jars of clay to show that this all-surpassing power is from God and not from us."— 2 Corinthians 4:7 (NIV)

In the ancient world clay jars were cheap, common, and prone to cracks. Yet Paul says God has deliberately placed the priceless treasure of the gospel inside just such breakable containers—inside us. It is a breathtaking mystery: God's Spirit and glory live in imperfect people so that His power, not ours, is on full display. Our outer life may be battered, but our inner life is upheld by divine strength. This is the heart of spiritual resilience: we endure hardship without being overcome because God Himself carries us.

The Japanese art of *kintsugi* repairs broken pottery with veins of gold, transforming cracked vessels into pieces more beautiful than before. Likewise, God never discards broken people. He heals us with grace, turning our scars into gold-filled seams that shine with His glory. *Here are Three Practices for Everyday Resilience*

1. Confess, don't conceal, your weakness.

Owning our fragility creates space for God's power to work.

2. Renew the inner self through Scripture and prayer.

Daily communion with God strengthens the inner person even when outer circumstances shake.

3. Share your broken pieces within the community.

When we pray for one another and hold each other's shattered fragments, the church becomes a living workshop of *kintsugi* grace.

Do you feel fractured today? Does life resemble a jar with widening cracks? Then remember Paul's bold confession: "For when I am weak, then I am strong."

— 2 Corinthians 12:10

God will not discard your cracked jar. Instead, He will fill every fracture with golden grace, and the very places of weakness will blaze with heaven's light. So do not lose heart. Treasure the truth that the priceless gospel dwells in you, and watch the Master Craftsman restore your brokenness into radiant beauty.

May you stand strong in His strength!

The vision states:

The United Methodist Church forms disciples of Jesus Christ, who empowered by the Holy Spirit, love boldly, serve joyfully, and lead courageously in local communities and worldwide connections.

This vision statement complements the Church's longstanding mission statement, inspired by Matthew 28:18-20: "The mission of The United Methodist Church is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world."

The vision encourages United Methodists to embody the following principles:

Love Boldly: Passionately love God and, like Jesus, embrace and include people of every age, nation, race, gender and walk of life. *Inspired by Matthew 22:37-39 and John 13:34-35*

Serve Joyfully: With a Christ-like heart, journey alongside the most vulnerable, offering care and compassion with joy.

Inspired by Psalm 100:1, Nehemiah 8:10, John 13:14-15 and 1 Peter 4:10

Lead Courageously: Follow Jesus' example by resisting and dismantling all systems of evil, injustice, and oppression, striving for peace, justice and reconciliation. *Inspired by Joshua 1:9 and Ephesians 6:10*

"This is a Kairos moment in the life of The United Methodist Church. This new vision is not simply a statement or a plan, it is a catalyst for transformation," said Bishop Tracy Smith Malone, President of the Council of Bishops. "It is a vision that will help the Church embrace the divine opportunities before us, to follow where God is leading us, and to more fully engage in our mission of making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world."

The Council of Bishops and the Connectional Table will work with our United Methodist General Agencies to create resources that inspire and equip disciples, leaders, and congregations to live into this vision. Resources will be shared at Annual Conference sessions and with leaders within local churches this summer, with lay member resources anticipated to follow in late 2025/early 2026.

LIVE STREAM FUNDRAISER

Dear Church Family,

We are excited to share that we will begin upgrading the **sanctuary's audio and video technology** in **June**! This has been a thoughtful process—over the past 10 months; we've conducted research, sought consultations, gathered feedback, and held in-depth discussions.

As a result, we have selected **Audio Contractors** as our trusted partner and have already paid **50% of the total project cost** to begin moving forward. The needed equipment has been ordered, and installation will begin as soon as it arrives. The entire project is expected to take approximately **one week** to complete.

This upgrade will replace our over **30-year-old sound system**, **install two 98-inch TV screens** on either side of the cross at the front of the sanctuary, **and one additional screen on the back wall**. We will also set up a **high-quality video camera** and **live-streaming equipment** to better connect with our congregation near and far. By embracing cutting-edge technology, we will:

- Help our home-bound and shut-in members stay connected to worship,
- Enrich the quality of our services,
- Welcome new visitors with greater accessibility, and
- Create a more engaging and inclusive worship environment for all.

The **total cost** of this project is **\$52,851.18**, and we anticipate possible additional labor costs related to electrical work. Through the **Ministry Enrichment Grant** from the Wisconsin Conference, we have been blessed to receive **\$15,000**.

Now, we are reaching out to you—our beloved church family—to help us raise the remaining \$38,000.

We believe this is not just an upgrade—it is an **investment in the future** of our church and its ministry. With your prayers and financial support, we can create a worship environment that reflects the excellence of God we serve and welcomes all who walk through our doors.

STEWARDSHIP - PAYING IT FORWARD

A LITTLE GIGGLE

David tells the story of a time he saw a car stalled at an intersection. The hood was up, and a young man waved him down for help. "I can't get it started," he said, "but if you jiggle the wire on the battery, I think it'll work."

David grabbed the positive battery cable—and it came off in his hand. The cable was clearly too loose." The terminal needs to be tightened," David told him. "I can fix it if you have some tools."

"My dad says to just jiggle the wire," the young man replied. "It always works. Why don't you just try that?"

David paused, sarcastically wondering why the young man's dad didn't ride around town with him, ready to jiggle the wire whenever needed. Then he said, "If I jiggle the wire, you're going to need someone to do it every time you shut the engine off. But if you give me two minutes and a wrench, we can solve the problem—and you can forget about it." Reluctantly, the young man fumbled under the front seat, then handed David a crescent wrench through the window of the old car.

As David tightened the terminal, he thought about how many times he'd asked God for a "quick fix" in his own life. "I have this problem, Lord, and if you'll just jiggle the wire, things will be okay. I'm in a hurry—just get me going again as fast as possible."

But God doesn't want to just jiggle wires, does He?

God wants to take the time to deal with the real issue—to actually fix the problem. A lasting solution to the struggles in our lives requires full surrender and a willingness to move forward on God's terms. We must cooperate with God—whatever it takes, for as long as it takes.

As the young man drove away with his tightened terminal, David paused and asked the Lord to say "No" the next time he was tempted to ask for a quick fix.
